# **National Tree Day**

Our Year 3-6 students showed great teamwork and resilience last week while helping our local Landcare volunteers plant native trees along the Pebble Beach walking track. Landcare is a community-led group that works to protect and restore our natural environment through activities such as revegetation, weed control, habitat restoration, and caring for local waterways, with the aim of planting over 1,000 trees along the Pebble Beach walking track this winter. Despite the light rain, students worked efficiently in groups of three to dig a hole, plant a tree, construct and install a tree guard, spread mulch, and water their plant.

# **RAP**

#### Our School's Journey with Marrung and Developing a Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP)

At Tawonga Primary School, we believe that every culture should be respected, celebrated, and valued. The Marrung Aboriginal Education Plan guides us in ensuring that all Koorie learners can achieve their aspirations, while helping every student gain a deeper understanding of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories, cultures, and contributions.

We've recently begun our journey towards creating a Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP)—a roadmap for how we will build relationships, show respect, and create opportunities for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples within our school community. This work isn't just about policies and actions; it's about reflection, growth, and being willing to look at things differently.

Just last month, three of our Koorie students joined other young people from across the Alpine Shire in Bright for a special day focused on sharing culture, listening to stories, and deepening understanding. They came back with pride in who they are and excitement to share their experiences.

On this journey, we know that some of us may need to uneducate ourselves—letting go of outdated or incomplete ideas—so we can re-educate ourselves with knowledge that is accurate, respectful, and inclusive. That's how we build genuine reconciliation: by listening, learning, and sometimes relearning.

In the coming months, we'll be inviting staff, students, and families to contribute their ideas as we shape our RAP. We'll be celebrating what we already do well, but also challenging ourselves to grow. Reconciliation is not a one-off project—it's something we live every day.

If you'd like to know more or be part of these conversations, please speak with Karen Crumpler, our Marrung Lead Teacher. Together, we can make our school a place where everyone feels a deep sense of belonging and pride in who they are.















# **Update**

Thanks to our grant from AGL and Gentile Steel for the construction, we now have a brand **new shed** for the storage of equipment. This will make set up and pack up more time efficient and will also mean that the children will be able to help.

The children will be conducting experiments this week for **National Science Week**.

They have participated in an emergency **evacuation drill** with the primary school which went smoothly.

Children have been learning that while many people talk about four **seasons**— spring, summer, autumn, and winter—Indigenous cultures often recognize six or seven seasons, showing how plants, animals, and weather change in more detailed and special ways.





#### JOEY HOPPET SCHOOL TEAM

#### We are looking for students to be part of a school team.

The Kangaroo Hoppet is an international cross country ski event with three race distances, the 42km main event, a 21km event and the 7km Joey Hoppet. It is held at Falls Creek on the fourth Saturday in August, the atmosphere will be fantastic - a great experience for kids and adults.

The School Challenge is perfect for all ages and abilities, the Joey Hoppet takes place on a wide, beautifully groomed course around the Sun Valley Loop at Falls Creek on mostly flat terrain.

The Joey School Competition has four categories for male (or mixed) and female teams from primary and secondary schools. Each team can have up to 5 skiers, with the best three times going toward the team's result. Schools may enter any number of teams.

Each skier receives a participant's badge, their souvenir bib and a show bag of goodies. Each school will receive a participation pennant.

Entries: Individual students need to enter themselves first, and then the teacher in charge registers the team. Early bird registrations are \$25 per student for entries received before Aug 14, then a late fee applies. Skis - students can borrowed our school skis at no cost.

Trophies and awards will be available for collection at the presentation evening on the Saturday night after the event.
